Occupation Description

Registered Nurses assess patient health problems and needs, develop and implement nursing care plans, and maintain medical records. They administer nursing care to ill, injured, convalescent, or disabled patients, and may advise patients on health maintenance and disease prevention or provide case management. Licensing or registration is required.

Associate of Applied Science in Nursing

The Associate in Applied Science in Nursing (A.A.S.N.) program is approved by the District of Columbia Board of Nursing and accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC). The curriculum provides the knowledge and skills essential to licensure as registered nurses (upon successful completion of the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX)), and allows graduates to provide nursing care in a variety of settings. The Licensed Practical Nurse Accelerated Curriculum (L.P.N. to A.A.S.N.) helps practicing licensed practical nurses complete the associate degree in one academic year after completing pre-nursing requirements. The program lasts 42 weeks and costs approximately \$3,270. The government may pay for all or part of this training program. 72 hours credit hours are required for completion.

Associate in Applied Science Degree in Nursing

NVCC's nursing program prepares students to give direct care to patients in a variety of health care facilities and agencies. Upon satisfactory completion of the program, students are eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) and achieve state licensure as a Registered Nurse (RN). They are then qualified to assume registered nurse positions in hospitals, nursing homes, clinics, physicians' offices, HMOs, and other community-based settings.
