

Supplemental Security Income (SSI)

What is Supplemental Security Income (SSI)?

SSI helps low-income people meet basic needs. SSI monthly cash payments are available to those who are:

- 65 and older
- Blind
- Disabled

How does it work?

SSI is a monthly payment made by the US Treasury Department to those who have little or no income and few resources. This means that the value of your savings, investments and possessions (not including your home or car) must be less than \$2,000 if you are single, or less than \$3,000 if you are married. Unlike unemployment insurance, SSI payments are not based on prior work. To receive SSI, you must also apply for all other available cash benefits. Receiving SSI can make you eligible for other benefits such as Food Stamps or Medicaid.

Additionally, those living in assisted living facilities or adult foster homes are also eligible for receiving a small [Supplemental State Payment \(SSP\)](#). This is a monthly cash benefit issued by the state to eligible individuals.

Immigration Status

To receive SSI you must be a US citizen or a member of specific categories of “alien”.

How does one apply?

- Call the local Social Security office.
